ENACTMENT RATE§ IN 1ST SESSION OF BILLS INTRODUCED DURING THE 1ST SESSION OF THE 153RD GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Out of the 295 bills introduced by the House of Representatives during the 1st session, 118 have been enacted into law during the 1st session. This gives an enactment rate of 40%.

Out of the 229 bills introduced by the Senate during the 1st session, 111 have been enacted into law during the 1st session. This gives an enactment rate of 48%.

VETOES IN 1ST SESSION OF BILLS INTRODUCED DURING THE 1ST SESSION OF THE 153RD GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The Governor did not veto any legislation introduced by the House during the 1st session.

The Governor vetoed 2 bills** introduced by the Senate during the 1st session.

- * General Assemblies begin the day after a general election and end the next general election. We have defined the 1st session as ending on the day the State would have a general election if held in an odd year. For this data, the "1st session" would be 11/6/2024 to 11/4/2025. This includes any legislation introduced in special or extraordinary sessions in this period.
- † In this report, each substitute to a bill counts as its own bill. For example, 1 bill with 1 substitute for that bill counts as 2 bills.
- ‡ In this report, an amendment to an amendment counts as its own piece of legislation. For example, House Amendment 1 to a bill and an amendment to House Amendment 1 would count as 2 amendments.
